

# Heideggers Interpretation Of Kant Categories Imagination And Temporality

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here stephen r palmquist attempts to revolutionise kant scholarship by demonstrating the high degree of systematic coherence and consistency in kant s entire philosophical project by using the principle of perspective as a technical tool palmquist reveals the theories in kant s critical works to be the architectonic elaboration of a single idea palmquist asserts that kant s system cannot be properly

interpreted without understanding its essentially constructive theocentric orientation and its systematic character thus the unity which the author discusses replaces the typical interpretation of kant s theology and philosophy of religion as an austere deistic agnosticism and moral reductionism with a richer more practical framework for theological thinking

this text presents a survey and evaluation of kant s theory of mind it focuses on kant s discussion of the paralogisms in the critique of pure reason and examines how the themes raised there are treated in the rest of kant s writings

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the eminent philosopher delivers an illuminating interpretation of kant s magnum opus in what is itself a significant work of western philosophy the text of martin heidegger s 1927 28 university lecture course on emmanuel kant s critique of pure reason presents a close interpretive reading of the first two parts of this masterpiece of modern philosophy in this course heidegger continues the task he enunciated in being and time as the problem of dismantling the history of ontology using temporality as a clue heidegger demonstrates that the relation between philosophy ontology and fundamental ontology is rooted in the genesis of the modern mathematical sciences he also shows that objectification of beings as beings is inseparable from knowledge a priori the central problem of kant s critique he concludes that objectification rests on the productive power of imagination a process that involves temporality which is the basic constitution of humans as beings

karl ameriks here collects his most important essays to provide a uniquely detailed and up to date analysis of kant s main arguments in all three major areas of his work theoretical philosophy critique of pure reason practical philosophy critique of practical reason and aesthetics critique of judgment a substantial specially written introduction sets out common themes in the structure and interpretation of kant s critical philosophy the first part of the book includes several of the author s well known essays on the critique of pure reason

emphasizing kant's central theoretical notions of a transcendental deduction and transcendental idealism and providing an extensive review of recent english and german scholarship in this area part ii includes new discussions of the critique of practical reason and its relation to kant's other main work in moral theory the groundwork of the metaphysics of morals part iii focuses on taste and the critique of judgment and on the controversial hypothesis that even in this area kant's position is fundamentally objective and conceptual this collection has two distinctive characteristics first it demonstrates in detail how for understanding the basic structure of any one of kant's critiques it is extremely important and helpful to keep in mind its logical and historical relation to kant's other critiques and hence to track the parallels and differences between theoretical practical and aesthetic forms of judgment and reason secondly the book makes interpretation itself a central issue that is not only does it offer a series of interrelated interpretations of kant's main works along with a detailed comparison and assessment of other interpretations but it also argues that the difficulty of interpretation is itself a central feature of the critical philosophy and that the difficulties of that philosophy have become paradigmatic for modern philosophy in general interpreting kant's critiques complements and extends the arguments of the author's earlier books kant's theory of mind and kant and the fate of autonomy it will find a wide readership not just amongst kant specialists but among the many philosophers following in his footsteps

in this illuminating study of kant's theory of imagination and its role in interpretation rudolf a makkreel argues against the commonly held notion that kant's transcendental philosophy is incompatible with hermeneutics the charge that kant's foundational philosophy is inadequate to the task of interpretation can be rebutted explains makkreel if we fully understand the role of imagination in his work in identifying this role makkreel also reevaluates the relationship among kant's discussions of the feeling of life common sense and the purposiveness of history

immanuel kant's work changed the course of modern philosophy in these essays karl ameriks examines how he compares the philosophical system set out in kant's critiques with the work of the major philosophers before and after him descartes berkeley hume reid jacobi reinhold the early german romantics hegel feuerbach and marx a systematic introduction argues that complexities in the interpretation of kant's system led to a new emphasis on history subjectivity and aesthetics this emphasis defined a distinctive interpretive style of philosophizing that has become especially influential and fruitful once again in our own time the individual essays

provide case studies in support of the thesis that late 18th century reactions to kant initiated an historical turn after which historical and systematic considerations became joined in a way that fundamentally distinguishes philosophy from science and art without falling back into mere historicism in this way it is shown that philosophy s historical turn is both similar to and unlike the turn to history undertaken by most other disciplines in this era part one argues that close attention to the historical context of kant s philosophy is crucial to avoiding frequent misunderstandings that have arisen in comparing kant with other major modern philosophers part two contends that it was mainly the writing of kant s first major interpreter that led to special philosophical emphasis on history in other major post kantian thinkers part three argues that hegel s system and its influence on post hegelians were determined largely by variations on reinhold s historical turn part four engages with major contemporary philosophers who have combined a study of particular themes in kant and german idealism with an appreciation for phenomena closely associated with the general notion of an historical turn in philosophy

immanuel kant s critique of pure reason is one of the most influential works in the history of philosophy not to mention one of the most challenging its topic is the nature of human knowledge and the question of whether or not it is possible to have knowledge of the world at all over two centuries later kant s treatise remains a subject of fierce debate among philosophers who continue to offer new interpretations of his meaning what is not in doubt is the work s originality and brilliance nor its mastery of creative thinking creative thinkers are able to bring a new perspective to questions and problems look at things from a different angle and show them in a fresh light kant achieved this by mediating between the two major schools of philosophical thought concerning knowledge empiricism and rationalism to create a complex third way where empiricists believed all knowledge is founded on experience and rationalists believed true knowledge is founded on reason alone kant evaluated their arguments and proposed a third position one incorporating elements of both but within specific limits as infamously dense as it is profound kant s critique shows creative thinking operating at a level few can aspire to reach

this key collection of essays sheds new light on long debated controversies surrounding kant s doctrine of idealism and is the first book in the english language that is exclusively dedicated to the subject well known kantians karl ameriks and manfred baum present their considered views on this most topical aspect of kant s thought several essays by acclaimed kant scholars broach a vastly neglected problem in discussions of kant s idealism namely the relation between his conception of logic and idealism the standard view that kant s logic and idealism are wholly separable comes under scrutiny in these essays a further set of articles addresses multiple facets of the notorious notion of the thing in itself which continues to hold the attention of kant scholars the volume also contains an extensive discussion of the often overlooked chapter in the critique of pure reason on the transcendental ideal together the essays provide a whole new outlook on kantian idealism no one with a serious interest in kant s idealism can afford to ignore this important book

the bounds of sense is one of the most influential books ever written about kant s philosophy and is one of the key philosophical works of the late twentieth century although it is probably best known for its criticism of kant s transcendental idealism it is also famous for

the highly original manner in which strawson defended and developed some of kant s fundamental insights into the nature of subjectivity experience and knowledge the book had a profound effect on the interpretation of kant s philosophy when it was first published in 1966 and continues to influence discussion of kant the soundness of transcendental arguments and debates in epistemology and metaphysics generally

this book examines the unique views of philosopher jacob sigismund beck a student of immanuel kant who devoted himself to an exploration of his teacher s doctrine and to showing that kant s transcendental idealism is contra to the common view both internally consistent and is not a form of subjective idealism in his attempt to explain away certain apparent contradictions found in kant s system beck put forward a new reading of kant s critical theory a view which came to be known as the standpunctslehre the doctrine of the standpoint author lior nitzan reconstructs step by step the historical development of beck s doctrine he shows how beck s unique view is drastically different from that of his contemporaries and presents the relevance of beck to contemporary debates about the proper interpretation of kant s notion of objectivity the refutation of idealism and the role of the thing in itself in kant s transcendental idealism in doing so nitzan presents a defense of beck s radical perspective of kant s theory and claims that some of kant s negative responses to it may in fact be due more to the adversary academic environment at the time than to kant s true well considered opinion jacob sigismund beck s standpunctslehre challenges the two dominant schools in the interpretation of kant s transcendental idealism the two world and the two aspect view it presents a new way of understanding kant s transcendental idealism according to which the thing in itself plays no positive role in relation to the possibility of experience moreover it claims that eliminating the thing in itself as the ultimate object of knowledge is not to admit idealism but in fact is the only way to consistently uphold realism in addition the book also addresses the question why assuming that the proposed interpretation is correct kant had chosen not to make his true intentions clear

this book argues that kant s transcendental idealism has been misinterpreted it denies not simply the super sensory reality of space time and appearances but their reality outside imagination as well after adducing extensive and explicit textual evidence in its favor waxman shows this interpretation to be essential to the transcendental deduction the affirmation of things in themselves and the attempt to surmount hume s scepticism he further argues that kant s much neglected claim that besides himself no psychologist has so much as even thought that the imagination might be a necessary constituent of perception should be construed so that even our consciousness of sensation itself visual tactile etc is impossible without imagination a compelling and original contribution to kantian scholarship kant s model of the mind will also bear close examination by students and scholars of hume the philosophy of mind and the philosophy of science

the sensible and intelligible worlds represents a new wave of interest in the metaphysical kant in recent decades kant scholars have increasingly become skeptical of interpreting kant as a philosopher who wished to truly leave metaphysics behind the contributors to this volume share a common commitment to the idea that kant s philosophy cannot be properly understood without careful attention to its metaphysical presuppositions and in particular to how those metaphysical presuppositions are compatible with kant s critique of more dogmatic forms of metaphysical thought the authors approach kant s thought from a wide variety of different perspectives emphasizing not just the familiar leibnizian background to kant s metaphysics but also its broadly aristotelian underpinnings and its relationship with metaphysical themes in post kantian german idealism similarly although most of the essays in this volume relate in some way to the familiar question of how best to interpret kant s transcendental idealism they also deal with a wide range of other topics including kant s modal metaphysics his views on the continuum his epistemology of the a priori and the foundations of his metaethical views

heidegger has a reputation for reading himself into the philosophers he interprets and his interpretation of kant has therefore had little uptake in anglophone kant scholarship in this book morganna lambeth provides a new account of heidegger s method of interpreting kant arguing that it is more promising than is typically recognized on her account heidegger thinks that kant s greatest insights are located in moments of tension where kant struggles to articulate something new about his subject matter the role of the interpreter then is to disentangle competing strands of argument and to determine which strand is most compelling lambeth traces heidegger s interpretive method across his reading of kant s critique of pure reason and situates heidegger s reconstruction of kant s best line of argument against other post kantian readings she finally shows how heidegger s deep engagement with kant sheds light on heidegger s own philosophical views

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
